Finally, some tips from Western Power on how you can prepare in case of a power cut:

- 1. Keep our telephone number handy or save it in your mobile phone (105 or 0800 6783 105) so that you can report a power cut or call for information and advice.
- 2. Keep a battery/solar charger handy so that you can recharge your smart phone or tablet and follow updates on social media, our online power cut map or Power Cut Reporter app.
- 3. Keep your freezer shut depending on the type of freezer you have, the contents could stay frozen for up to 12 hours.
- 4. Check that you have a phone available that will work in a power cut digital or cordless ones may not work.
- 5. Have things like a torch or lantern ready (it is best not to use candles or paraffin lights).
- 6. Protect sensitive electrical equipment such as computers with a surge protector plug.
- 7. If you have a mains-operated stair lift, check to see if there is a manual release handle that can be used to return it safely to ground level if it stops working.

# Interesting facts - Core Government funding in Herefordshire Council



Residents who believe that their health and wellbeing has been directly affected by intensive poultry farming are asked to share their experience and evidence

There has been a significant increase in intensive poultry farming in Herefordshire in recent years. While many residents welcome the business opportunities and cheaper food products that this brings, others feel there is a direct impact on their health and wellbeing.

We are carrying out a review to consider the potential impacts of intensive poultry farming in the county, and is asking residents who believe that their health and wellbeing has been directly affected to share their experience and evidence.

Over the coming months, a task and finish group with cross-party councillor membership, will:

- Review published literature to assess the strength of existing scientific evidence, the
  potential health and wellbeing impacts identified by this evidence and where such impacts
  might occur
- Examine whether health data held by or available to the council and key health partners is sufficient enough to allow for analysis and identification of potential impacts in Herefordshire
- Better understand what work is taking place nationally, or is planned, to gather data and examine health and wellbeing impacts

The relevant health functions of the council and how these could be utilised to address health impacts will also be considered, alongside the roles of other agencies, so that it is satisfied that this is being done.

The task and finish group will report to the adults and wellbeing scrutiny committee.

## Have your say on how traffic regulations are enforced

Herefordshire Council is asking residents for their views on the introduction of measures to enforce moving traffic regulations.

This includes stopping in yellow boxes at junctions, ignoring no-entry signs, making banned turns, contravening 'access only' routes and parking on yellow zig-zag lines outside schools.

Traffic regulations act to make the roads safer for all users and to help keep traffic flowing in busy areas.

Changes in Government legislation (implementation in full of Part 6 of the Traffic Management Act 2004) mean that councils in England will have control of enforcement powers for moving traffic contraventions, previously held by the police. Measures to enforce moving traffic regulations include the installation of cameras and the issuing of penalty notices.
